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

- This course is an intelligent and innovative approach to the subject. The author has created a unique vocabulary to explain music topics, but then describes those ideas using typical music words like rhythm, meter, major, minor etc. The average student would be lost in such abstraction. As a music prof I enjoyed it very much. Students would have to learn not only those standard music words but his unique vocabulary. They would not be able to take those ideas into other humanities courses, thereby losing an important cross-disciplinary advantage. There are some wonderful approaches here, but I cannot recommend it.
- Compared to a standard music appreciation textbook, there is a dearth of visual images to connect to the material. No graphs or art work. No test banks. There is a listening example section with self-checking drop-down bars. No summative assessments.
